Growing Together: A Year-End Reflection

As we close the year, I'm excited to share new developments at World Forestry Center and invite you to join us for the experiences and events ahead. Everything we do is focused on expanding our community and deepening our impact.

ROOTED

For nearly 60 years, World Forestry Center has put down deep, steady roots—roots nourished by people like you. Your belief in our mission has helped us nurture both the forests we depend on and the communities that they sustain. We are grateful for your partnership.

RESILIENT

This year marked a period of significant growth and renewal on our campus and in our Discovery Museum. We doubled museum visitation, set an all-time single-day attendance record, presented inventive art exhibitions, launched new performance art initiatives, and brought our collaborative Forest Pubs off-campus to new audiences every month, at an often sold-out Mission Theater. Most notably, we opened our first new permanent museum exhibit in 20 years—an immersive theater experience exploring wildfire, climate, and forests. We also wrapped up programming that brought together many non-forestry sectors in our first wildfire Fellowship cohort and deepened our engagement of a single non-forestry sector by organizing the first national workshop of public health leaders to discuss the public health impacts of catastrophic wildfire smoke. Through creative collaborations, we are welcoming new voices and inspiring all generations to join the sustainable forestry conversation. And we are only getting started.

RISING

In 2026, we celebrate our 60th Anniversary—a moment that invites reflection and sparks transformation. We will expand our arts initiative with forest sound walks and musical performances, host thought-provoking art exhibitions and Forest Pubs, and advance major updates to the Discovery Museum and our campus that connect people to the living story of forests. The work we do this year lays the foundation for even greater impact in the decades ahead.

New Permanent Exhibition Transforms Theater

This fall we began a museum transformation by renovating the theater to house an immersive film experience.

The three-part video installation uses powerful storytelling to highlight forest management as a vital climate solution and a shared social priority, and it is already reshaping how visitors understand the connection between climate change, catastrophic wildfire, and forest management.

“This new installation is unlike anything we’ve done before,” said Tim Hecox, Director of Experience and Programs.

“It helps people see how deeply forests are connected to today’s climate and wildfire challenges—and how collective action *is* still possible.”

World Forestry Center Hosts First National Wildfire Smoke and Public Health Workshop

In November, World Forestry Center convened public health experts, forestry professionals, and policy leaders from across the country for a two-day national workshop focused on one of today’s most urgent and under-recognized public health threats: wildfire smoke. Together, participants examined the root causes and cascading impacts of smoke, explored the links between forest management and community health, and built a shared understanding of what is at stake—and what must change—to enable meaningful, long-term solutions.

The gathering fostered new relationships and laid the foundation for a sustained cross-sector network committed to elevating wildfire smoke as a national priority. Representatives from the American Lung Association, Fire Adapted Learning Network, MegaFire Action, National Tribal Air Association, Oregon Health Authority, Stanford Medicine, The Nature Conservancy, and other leading organizations helped shape a roadmap that will guide continued collaboration and inform broader strategy development in 2026.

Experimental Music: Partnering with Third Angle New Music

In October, we partnered with Portland's beloved experimental music commissioners, Third Angle New Music, to celebrate their 40th anniversary and co-curate forest-themed performances. Over two nights in Miller Hall, audiences experienced music inspired by the Pacific Northwest forests with poetry by 2022 Oregon Poet Laureate Kim Stafford—marking a first for us in presenting an arts partnership showcasing experimental music.

The performance featured a string quartet and clarinet performing works that captured the region's forested landscapes and spirit. Stafford's poetry wove through the compositions, creating a meditative dialogue between words and music.

Stay tuned! May 15th, 2026, we will be closing Third Angle's 40th anniversary season as we celebrate our own 60th anniversary. Join us for a world-premiere wildfire oratorio created in partnership with Oregon Repertory Singers Youth Choir, Third Angle, and yours truly, World Forestry Center.



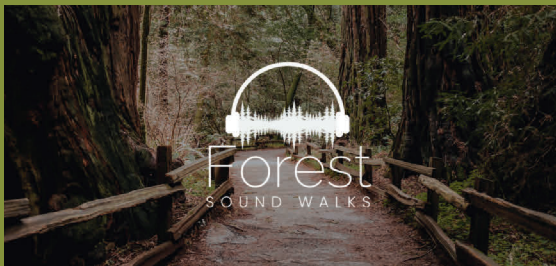
Experience the Forest Like Never Before

Forest Sound Walks is a new, free experimental music series that invites you to experience local forests in an entirely new way. Collaborating with contemporary musicians and sound ecologists, we have created original site-specific compositions inspired by Oregon's trails.

"These place-based walks give us permission to rethink how we move through and relate to forests." - Stephanie Stewart Bailey, Experience Developer

Each piece comes with a downloadable map, a forester's introduction, and an indigenous perspective, offering insight into the landscape's ecology, history, and stewardship.

Hikers can listen while exploring the trail, turning an ordinary walk into an immersive, meditative experience. The series invites listeners to slow down, tune in, and discover the subtle rhythms of the forest. For those unable to visit the trails in person, each composition can also be enjoyed anywhere as a calming, restorative sound bath. More to come in 2026! Innovation Takes Center Stage Spring 2026

Our next featured art exhibition, *Forest Hope Through Innovation*, opens March 1, 2026. This interdisciplinary collection showcases how creativity, research, art, and community action are shaping a sustainable future for forests. The exhibition highlights emerging forest-based technologies, design, and artist–scientist collaborations, featuring the work of 12 innovators. By bringing behind-the-scenes research into a public gallery, the show acts as a living laboratory that invites visitors to engage, inquire, and imagine solutions.

JF Thye

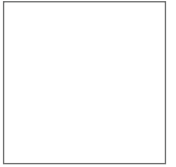
